
FLOOD EVENT FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 2023






- Addressed the coordination early morning with the BOE superintendent
- Approximately 3.84 inches of rain
- OEM, Police, Fire, Streets, Signal, Engineering and Parks were in preparation before the storm and we were prepared
- Governor Murphy Declares State of Emergency Due to Severe Weather Friday afternoon

FLOOD EVENT - FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 2023 **RESIDENTIAL IMPACTS:**

- Less than 5 resident homes were impacted
- OF PROPARES OF THE PROPERTY OF
- Emergency Services consistently patrolled all flood prone areas
- No calls for service were made to Police or Fire during the event
- Two residential homes utilized the Village's offer for supplemental trash collection on Monday, October 2nd
- Village Manager's Office reached out to affected homeowners to assess additional support

FLOOD EVENT - FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 2023 **RESIDENTIAL RESPONSE:**



Letter from OEM outlining:

- Registration for Emergency Alert Notifications
 - Reverse 911, emails and text messages
- WaterAlerts, a free service of the U.S. Geological Survey
 - Provides instant alerts when water levels are nearing flood stage
- Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service NWS
 - Allows real-time monitoring of river flows



FLOOD EVENT - FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 2023 VILLAGE MOBILIZATION:

• Village Hall parking lot was cleared



- The municipal fleet was moved to higher ground
- Police, Fire, OEM & Streets monitored flood prone areas and blocked flooded roadways as needed
- Recycling Yard was cleared of equipment and vehicles and closed to the public (Closed on Saturday, September 30, 2023)
- Shred Day was postponed until Sunday, October 15, 2023
- BOE and Parks Division removed equipment to secure parks and fields

FLOOD EVENT - FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 2023 VILLAGE PRE-PLANNING:

- In 2022, Public Works/Engineering contracted with Downes Tree Service to de-snag, de-slit and ensure bank stabilization along the Ho-Ho-Kus Brook
- The project cost an estimated \$438,000 and was funded, in part, through a grant from the USDA
- This work effort reduced vegetation build up, along with down trees/brush and removed materials from the brook allowing for increased flow
- All work was properly permitted through the NJ DEP

FLOOD EVENT - FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 2023 PROGRAMMING IMPACTS:

• Village Parks & Recreation and Ridgewood School District programs have been displaced



- P&R Director and District Athletic Director, along with their staff worked through the weekend to relocate programs, assess damages and meet with turf repair firms to seek cost estimates for clean up
- Temporary fields have been set up at local schools to accommodate youth programs
- Village and BOE staff met on Monday to finalize temporary scheduling and discuss path forward
- Fields Committee met on Tuesday morning to report out on progress

- Veterans Field was fully opened for use today
- Maple Field repair/clean up quote is \$52,354., as submitted by LandTek
- The area behind The Stable parking lot needs to be cleaned once completely dried out and will be addressed by the Parks Division staff
- Parks & Recreation will continue to work with programs to schedule accordingly until Maple Field can be re-opened
- Communications with program participants will continue until all schedules return to normal
